Recommendations



Target Most Vulnerable

- This can be done via scored assessment
- Target traits that increase risk of homelessness
- Disperse this funding in a way that provides funding to highest risk first

Risk Factors for Homelessness

- Pregnancy
- Child younger than two
- Currently receiving public assistance
- Eviction threat from landlord
- Moved frequently in the past year
- Involvement with protective services
- High conflict with landlord
- Disruptions as a child (foster care, shelter)
- Shelter history as an adult
- Recent shelter application
- Seeking to reintegrate from an institution

Assessment Example

- One Point for
- Pregnancy
- Child Under two
- No High School or GED
- Not Currently employed
- Not a leaseholder
- Reintegrating into community




- **Two Points for**

- Receiving public assistance

- Protective services involvement

- Evicted or asked to leave by landlord

- Applying for shelter in the last three months

- 
- Three points for
 - Reports of previous shelter stay as an adult



- **Age**

- One point if 23-28
- Two points if 22 or younger

- **Moves last year**

- One point if one to three moves
- Two points if four or more moves

- **Disruptive experiences in childhood**

- One point if one to two experiences
- Two points if three or more experiences

- **Discord (Landlord/Leaseholder/within household)**

- One point if moderate
- Two points if severe

Prevention Affinity Group

- Agencies come together and disperse money more effectively
- Use unrestricted funds last
- If done correctly more people will be served

Track Data

- Use a spreadsheet to record client's status
- Contact shelters if unable to reach the client
- This will help agencies disperse money more effectively
